## National Dog Bite Prevention Week, April 14-20, 2019

Sponsored by the United States Postal Service ${ }^{\circledR}$, National Dog Bite Prevention Week* is a public service campaign that offers safety tips and emphasizes the need for increased owner responsibility in the prevention of dog attacks.

From nips and bites to vicious attacks, aggressive dog behavior poses a serious threat to our employees. To emphasize the enormity of this issue, the Postal Service ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ is reporting the number of dog attacks and bites together as the most prominent threat to carriers. Last year, 5,714 Postal Service employees were victimized by dogs.

The tools available in this kit and online will help promote the awareness of this public health concern in an effort to reduce the number of adverse interactions with our letter carriers in local communities. Be sure to contact the field communications professionals listed in this kit when promoting this initiative.

## Dog Bite Prevention Background and Tips

## The Victims

- Last year, many attacks reported by letter carriers came from dogs whose owners regularly used the phrase, "My dog won't bite."


## How to Avoid Being Bitten

- Don't run past a dog. The dog's natural instinct is to chase people who run.
- If a dog threatens you, don't scream. Avoid eye contact. Try to remain still until the dog leaves, and then back away slowly until the dog is out of sight.
- Don't approach a strange dog, especially one that's tethered or confined.
- While letter carriers are discouraged from petting animals, people who choose to pet dogs should always let a dog see and sniff them before petting the animal.
- If a dog is about to attack, try to place something between yourself and the dog, such as a satchel, backpack, or bicycle.


## How to Be a Responsible Dog Owner

- Obedience training can teach dogs proper behavior and help owners control their dog in any situation.
- When a letter carrier comes to the home, keep dogs:
- Inside the house or behind a fence,
- Away from the door,
- In another room, or
- On a leash.
- Dogs can be protective of their territory and may interpret the actions of letter carriers as a threat. Take precautions when accepting mail in the presence of your pet.
- Dogs that haven't been properly socialized, receive little attention or handling, or are left tied-up for long periods may become biters.

\section*{Information for All Mail Carriers}

\section*{Dog Attack Prevention Tips for Mail Carriers How to Help Prevent Dog Attacks}

Make an effort every day to do the following:
1. Carry dog repellent.
2. Update dog warning cards, if necessary. The safety of your coworkers starts with you.
3. Take messages on your Mobile Delivery Device (MDD) seriously when you receive an alert about hazards, such as dogs, on your route.
4. Report any dog incidents on your route (e.g., close calls) to your supervisor. An "almost bite" today could be a "bite" tomorrow.
Remember these simple rules:
1. If approached by a dog, resist the impulse to scream and run away. Running will trigger a chase response.
2. Remain still, place your satchel between you and the dog, and avoid eye contact with the dog.
3. Once the dog has calmed down, back away. Do not turn your back on a dog because a fearful dog may unexpectedly bite.
Be aware of your surroundings to protect yourself:
1. Stay alert at all times:
a. Observe the area carefully.
b. Don't wear earbuds or Bluetooth devices that could affect your ability to hear what is going on around you.
c. Be aware of common places dogs may hide (e.g., under parked cars, under hedges, or on porches).
d. Rattle the gate before entering a fenced-in yard.
2. If you encounter a dog:
a. Never assume that a dog won't bite, even if it has been friendly in the past. Any dog can bite.
b. Always keep your eye on the dog. Dogs are more likely to bite when you aren't looking.
c. Never startle a dog. If it is asleep, make some kind of non-startling noise, such as a soft whistling, or call its name if you know the dog. Do this before getting close to the dog to ensure time and space for an "out." Never reach out and pet the dog.
d. Stand your ground. Turn and face the dog. Hold something in front of you, like your satchel, and back away slowly to ensure you don't stumble and fall. Never turn and run!
e. Keep at least one full can of dog repellent spray within reach at all times. If a dog attacks, use the repellent to protect yourself. Before going on your route, make sure your can has not expired.
3. Use these preventative measures:
a. No one likes a surprise. Fill out a Dog Warning Card for your route, so the information can be entered into the system and sent via MDD.
b. Notify your supervisor that there is an unresolved dog hazard that makes you fearful on the route.

Can you picture a member of your family attacking a mail carrier? Of course you couldn't, but it happened 5,714 times last year across the nation.

Dearborn, MI, Letter Carrier Tameka Toliver recalls being pinned on a porch by a dog that bit her above her knee. "It happened so fast, even with all my training, I barely had time to react," Toliver told coworkers at an event at the Dearborn Post Office. "I'm still scared when I get close to that house because I remember the attack so vividly. It takes a long time to get over the fear."

When a dog attacks a letter carrier, the dog owner could be held liable for all medical expenses, repayment of lost work hours, replacement of the uniform and other costs, which can run into thousands of dollars. The Postal Service makes the safety of its employees a top priority and dedicates a week each April to dog bite awareness.

Here are four simple tips to prevent dog bite injuries year round:
Door Delivery: If a carrier delivers mail or packages to your front door, place your dog in a separate room and close that door before opening the front door. Some dogs push through screen doors to attack visitors. Dog owners must keep the family pet secured. Never take mail directly from carriers in the presence of the family pet, as the dog may see this as a threatening gesture.

Electronic Fencing: Carriers may assume, if they see no physical fence around a property, that the property is animal-free. This can be a dangerous mistake. Postal Service officials request that you keep your dog restrained or inside when the mail is delivered. Although the electronic fence may keep your dog from wandering, it does not protect your carrier, who must enter your property to deliver the mail. Even homes with curbside mailboxes may have oversized packages or signature-needed items that require the carrier to approach a doorstep and cross the boundaries of the electronic fence. This poses a serious risk to carrier safety.

Dog in the Yard: Make sure your dog is properly restrained on a leash and away from where your mail carrier delivers the mail. If the carrier deems a residence unsafe because of an unrestrained dog, mail delivery service can be interrupted. When service is interrupted at an address or in a neighborhood, all parties involved will have to pick up mail at their local Post Office. Service will be restored once assurance has been given that the animal will be confined during regular delivery hours.

Tracking: Dog owners who have access to postal notification features, such as Informed Delivery (informeddelivery.usps.com) for letter mail and package tracking, are urged to use these features to determine when the carrier is on their way and to ensure their dog has been properly restrained. Expecting a postal package delivery on Sunday? Postal officials urge dog owners to restrain their animals on Sundays as well, as more residences now receive deliveries throughout the weekend.

Dear Editor,
Did anyone bite you at work today?

On average, nearly 15 mail carriers per day will say, "Yes."
Postal Service officials report that in 2018, 5,714 letter carriers experienced dog bites or dog attacks. With deliveries every day, including Sundays and holidays, carriers continue to experience dog bites in urban, suburban and rural settings.

Dog attacks and bites are 100 percent preventable when dog owners remain vigilant and properly restrain their dogs.

To ensure mail carriers' safety, dog owners must securely lock their dog in another room until a delivery exchange is done. If outside, dogs must be leashed at a distance from the mailbox.

When a carrier feels unsafe, mail service could be interrupted, not only for the dog owner, but for the entire neighborhood. When mail service is interrupted, mail must be picked up at the Post Office. Service will not be restored until the dog is properly restrained.

With your help, we can keep our carriers, your neighbors and your dogs safe. Thank you for protecting your pet and our mail carriers as we continue to bring packages and correspondence to your door each day.

Your letter carrier takes pride in delivering your mail promptly and efficiently. That means being able to approach your mailbox without interference from your pet.

Although your dog may not be known to bite or otherwise be dangerous to people, your carrier has expressed concern about its behavior. I believe you will agree this concern is understandable, since thousands of letter carriers receive bites or other physical harm from dogs each year. Many of these attacks result in serious injury.

This letter is to inform you that we are concerned your dog may have a tendency to attack, bite, or otherwise injure your letter carrier.

To continue providing uninterrupted mail delivery to you while protecting our letter carriers, the Postal Service requests your assistance. Please confine your dog - either in the house or fenced outdoors on a leash - away from the path your carrier uses to deliver your mail.

We appreciate your cooperation.

\section*{Dog Attack Prevention Speech for School Children - grades K-2}
[Make the presentation light and fun. Even though this is a serious subject, children will respond to a friendly and approachable adult.]

Good morning boys and girls.
My name is [Name] and I'm your postmaster. [Tell the children what a postmaster is/does.]
I am here today because I have a message from Postal Pup! [Open a letter in an envelope with this message.]

Postal Pup needs your help!
I am going to read you a message from Postal Pup:
Hello Kids! Postal Pup here!
Your mail carrier loves delivering your mail but sometimes your dogs don't love the mail carrier. Some mail carriers have to go to the hospital because of dogs in the neighborhood and that's no fun, right? As dogs, we love our human families, but when we see the mail carrier, we can get overprotective.

If you are in your yard and the mail carrier wants to hand you a letter, what does that look like to you? [Reach to a child and hand them a "letter" - wait for excited response.]

I know it seems fun, but your dog doesn't know if you are having fun. If your dog doesn't know you're having fun, he might bite the mail carrier. Ouch! You must let your mail carrier place the mail in your mail box.

Our job as dogs is to protect each and every one of you, the ones we love. Sometimes when we are overprotective, we bite the mail carrier to protect you. Some days, we are tired, cranky, or hungry and we get into a bad mood - just like our human families.

A lot of mail carriers are being bitten by dogs each year, and I need your help to make sure your mail carrier is safe. The best way to keep your mail carrier safe is to make sure your dog is away from the door when the mail carrier comes to deliver the mail.

If you go outside, make sure your dog doesn't get out. Always close the door behind you when you leave the house. If you are outside with your dog, make sure your dog is away from the mail carrier and on a leash so the mail carrier cannot get hurt. Always be kind to your dog and all dogs.

Here are some safety tips you can take home and please go over what we spoke about today with your family. Last but not least, as a way to remember this safety talk - sing it with me: When you see your mail carrier every day, make sure your dog is put away.

Thank you for letting me speak to you today. Have a great and safe rest of the year!

\section*{Glossary}

Curtailed Mail: The non-delivery of mail to a customer in cases where the premises are hazardous (e.g., an unrestrained dog).

City Carrier: An employee who cases, delivers, and collects all mail classes along a city route by walking or driving to residences and businesses within an area authorized for city delivery service.

City Carrier Assistant (CCA): A non-career employee who alternates for regular City Carriers.
Customer Service Supervisor: Supervisor who oversees the sorting and delivery of incoming and outgoing mail and parcels at local Post Offices.

Dog Owner's Responsibility: It is the dog owner's responsibility to control the dog. Most communities have ordinances for the control of dogs.

Dog Warning Card: Card that alerts your CCA/RCA or Carrier Substitute that a dog is at the address.
Dog Repellent: Dog repellent is to be used on any dog that attacks. The repellent consists of 0.35 percent oleoresin capsicum (extract of cayenne pepper) and 99.65 percent mineral oil, propelled by an inert gas contained in an aerosol spray can.

Employee Health and Safety: An online application for reporting accidents and injuries and managing claims for postal employees.

Job Safety Analysis: A procedure that reviews a specific task to uncover hazards or accidentproducing situations.

Mailbag: See Satchel.
Mobile Delivery Devices (MDDs): A device letter carriers use to scan packages to confirm delivery. MDDs include a feature that allows carriers to indicate the presence of a dog at an individual address. This is especially helpful to substitutes who fill in for letter carriers on their days off.

Non-delivery of Mail Policy: Collection and delivery service personnel are to report the name and address of the customer where such interference occurs to the postmaster or authorized supervisor, who must immediately telephone the customer (if possible) and request that the animal be confined during the usual delivery hours in the neighborhood. The postmaster or authorized supervisor must further inform the customer that:
- No deliveries will be made until this is done, and
- Service will be restored upon assurance that the animal will be confined.

Officer in Charge (OIC): A career employee appointed temporarily to fill a postmaster vacancy during which the accountability of postmaster is transferred to that employee.

Package Pickup: Available on usps.com, customers can let the organization know if a dog is present at the customer's address. USPS \({ }^{\circledR}\) will send the information to letter carriers' MDDs.

Parcel: Mail that does not meet the mail processing category of letter-size mail or flat-size mail. It is usually a package or an item enclosed in a mailing container such as a carton.

Postmaster: The manager in charge of a Post Office \({ }^{\text {TM }}\).

Postmaster General: The chief executive officer of USPS, who is named by and serves at the pleasure of the Board of Governors. As a member of the Board, this officer appoints the Deputy Postmaster General jointly with the Board.

Rehabilitation Assignment: An assignment into which the Postal Service places an injured employee when the employee's doctor notifies the Postal Service that the employee still has medical restrictions that prohibit the employee from returning to his or her job.

Rural Carrier: An employee assigned to case, deliver, and collect mail using a vehicle along a rural route and to provide most services available at a small Post Office.

Rural Carrier Associate (RCA): A non-career bargaining unit employee assigned as a leave replacement on rural routes during the absence of the regular rural carriers.

Satchel: A general term the pouch carriers use to carry mail. Sometimes used informally to describe a carrier's mailbag. As of 2002, many carriers prefer the traditional single satchel, which offers better protection from charging dogs.

Warning Letter: Letter to alert dog owner(s) to the possible loss of mail delivery if they do not restrain their pets.

\section*{DMM Revision: New Mailing Standards for Mailpieces Containing Liquids}

Effective March 28, 2019, the Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) is revising Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM \({ }^{\circledR}\) ), section 601.3.4, to clarify mailing standards for packaging and marking mailpieces containing nonhazardous liquids.

On July 9, 2018, the Postal Service published a Federal Register proposed rule (83 FR 31712-31713), titled "New Mailing Standards for Mailpieces Containing Liquids." In this proposed rule, the Postal Service announced its intent to revise DMM 601.3.4 relating to mailpieces containing nonhazardous liquids, and to similarly revise Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Mail, to align with the wording and requirements in DMM 601.3.4.

Following feedback received on its proposed rule, on March 18, 2019, the Postal Service published a final rule (84 FR 9716-9719), also titled "New Mailing Standards for Mailpieces Containing Liquids." In the final rule or planned revision, the Postal Service moved forward with the proposed clarification wording and incorporated additional changes that mailers suggested during the comment period for the proposed revision. Specifically, the Postal Service will remove ambiguity in the meaning of "breakable container" as defined in the rule, in addition to clarifying packaging requirements for those containers.

The Postal Service expects these revisions to improve compliance by reducing confusion about the definition and rule-consequently limiting the frequency of noncompliant mailers.

Also, for convenience and simplicity, in addition to including wording and rules in Publication 52 similar to those in revised section 601.3.4, the Postal Service will consolidate requirements for packaging liquids from Publication 52 into revised section 601.3.4, adding a reference to Publication 52, section 226, regarding requiring package orientation markings for mailing liquids and other spillable materials.

In its July 9, 2018, proposed rule, the Postal Service stated that mailpieces containing liquids are often not marked on the outer mailing container as required in DMM 601.3.4. In these cases, the Postal Service often finds that leaking mailpieces contain plastic primary receptacles. Mailers frequently related that they do not consider plastic primary receptacles to be breakable, and, therefore, do not
cushion primary receptacles with absorbent material and include secondary containers as specified in DMM 601.3.4.

The proposed rule consisted of two components:
1. Clarification of existing language that specified packaging and markings for mailpieces containing liquids.
2. A proposal to extend the requirement to triple-package breakable primary containers with volumes of 4 ounces or less.

Current mailing standards require triple packaging only for breakable primary containers over 4 ounces.

The Postal Service received 20 responses to the July 9, 2018, published proposed rule, with some responders providing multiple comments. Some commenters supported the proposed revision, and some opposed it. Commenters included trade groups representing shippers of hazardous materials, individual mailers, mailer organizations, pharmaceutical mailers, technical and professional service providers, and Postal Service employees.

As a result of concerns that commenters voiced to the proposed rule, the Postal Service will not move forward at this time with its proposal to require triple-packaging of breakable primary containers with a volume of 4 ounces or less. The Postal Service will continue to monitor the frequency and impact of spills originating from these smaller containers, and determine at a future date revised mailing standards relating to smaller containers of liquids.

Although the Postal Service will not publish these revisions in the DMM until June 23, 2019, the standards are effective immediately.

\subsection*{3.4 Liquids}
[Revise 3.4 to read as follows:]
Mailers must mark the outer container of a mailpiece containing liquid to indicate the nature of the contents (i.e., liquid), and include orientation arrows in accordance with Publication 52, section 226. Mailers must package and mail liquids according to the following requirements:
a. Use screw-on caps (with a minimum of one and onehalf turns), soldering, clips, or similar means to close primary containers containing liquids. Do not use containers with friction-top closures (push-down tops) except as provided in 3.4c. The use of locking rings or similar devices are encouraged when mailing containers with friction-top closures (push-down tops).
b. Liquids in steel pails and drums with positive closures, such as locking rings or recessed spouts under screw-cap closures, may be mailed without additional packaging.
c. Breakable containers including, but not limited to, those made of glass, plastic, porcelain, and earthenware, and metal containers with pull-tabs (pop-tops) or friction-top closures, having a capacity of more
than 4 fluid ounces must be triple-packaged according to the following requirements:
1. Cushion the primary container(s) with absorbent material capable of absorbing all of the liquid in the container(s) in case of breakage;
2. Place the primary container inside another sealed, leakproof container (secondary container), such as a watertight can or plastic bag; and
3. Use a strong and securely sealed outer mailing container durable enough to protect the contents and withstand normal processing in Postal Service networks.
d. As an alternative to 3.4 c , mailers may use containers certified under the International Safe Transit Association (ISTA) Test Procedure 3A. Mailers must, upon request, provide written test results verifying that sample mailpieces passed each test outlined in the standard and that no liquids were released.

\section*{IMM Revision: Individual Country Listing for Dominica}

Effective March 28, 2019, the Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) is revising the Individual Country Listing for Dominica in Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service, International Mail Manual \(\left(\mathrm{IMM}^{\circledR}\right)\) to note that Dominica is prohibiting lithium batteries and aerosols, as well as requesting the inclusion of both the addressee's and sender's contact information on all mail items.

These revisions are based on formal requests that Dominica Postal Service made through the Universal Postal Union via the following International Bureau Circulars (IBCs):
- IBC 156, dated November 5, 2018 (prohibiting lithium batteries and aerosols).
- IBC 133, dated September 24, 2018 (requesting the inclusion of both the addressee's and sender's contact information).

Effective November 30, 2018, the Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) revised chapters 5 and 7 of the Postal Operations Manual (POM) to update policies and procedures related to mail transportation and postal vehicle safety. The revision includes changes due to the implementation of two Step 4 grievance settlements.

\section*{Publication 52 Revision: Updates to Mailing Standards for Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Materials}

Effective March 28, 2019, the Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) is revising Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Mail, to provide minor changes to mailing standards, enhance clarity, update terminology, and correct erroneous references and omissions.

Effective October 1, 2018, the minimum age for purchasing cigarettes and other tobacco products in the District of Columbia changed from age 18 to age 21. In addition, Hawaii, California, New Jersey, Maine, and Oregon require purchasers of tobacco to be age 21 or older, and Alaska, Alabama, and Utah require purchasers to be age 19 or older. The Postal Service will revise Exhibit 472.25 to reflect the change to the minimum age in the District of Columbia. Postal Service employees must be aware of these requirements and ensure that the sender and recipient meet the required minimum age as specified in Publication 52.

On June 1, 2015, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) updated the Hazard Communications Standard to require a new uniform format for Safety Data Sheets (SDS) (formerly known as Material Safety Data Sheets or MSDS). To reflect the new terminology, the Postal Service will perform a global change throughout Publication 52 to replace the term "Material Safety Data Sheet" with the term "Safety Data Sheet," and replace "MSDS" with "SDS." The Postal Service will also add the term "SDS" to the index, and revise Appendix D to include the new OSHA definition.

The Postal Service is aware that lighters fueled by butane and flammable liquids are now used for various purposes. As a result, the Postal Service will replace the term "cigarette lighter" with "lighter" in various sections of Publication 52. With this change, the Postal Service will also update various other references and add clarifying revisions relating to lighters.

In response to requests from mailers of eCigarette nicotine solutions, pesticides, and other nonregulated toxic materials, the Postal Service will relax its current section 346.232 restriction of a single primary receptacle for mailings of some nonregulated toxic materials. The Postal Service will now permit multiple primary receptacles, provided the aggregate quantity of toxic materials are within the specified limits. The Postal Service also updates the references in 346.232 to align with those of the Department of Transportation (DOT), and clarifies the requirement for tri-ple-packaging of liquid nonregulated toxic materials when an aggregate quantity exceeds 4 ounces in a single mailpiece.

To align its dangerous mail protocols with those of other federal agencies, in 2013, the United States Postal Inspection Service \({ }^{\circledR}\) requested that the Postal Service revise Exhibit 347.22, Activity Limits for Mailable Instruments, Articles, and Limited Quantity Radioactive Materials, to align with those permitted by DOT. This revision was made on October 31, 2013. The Postal Service will now revise section 347.2, section 622.3, and Packaging Instruction 7A to specify that the activity limits provided in Exhibit 347.22 apply only to domestic mailings, and that international mailings are restricted to one-tenth of the activity limits provided in Exhibit 347.22.

In response to several recent spills of metallic mercury in its networks, the Postal Service will revise section 348.22 g to clarify that UN3506, Mercury contained in manufactured articles, does not include thermometers, barometers, and similar devices containing metallic mercury, and that devices containing enough mercury to be seen with the naked eye are generally nonmailable.

Effective March 28, 2019, the Postal Service will revise Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM \({ }^{\circledR}\) ), section 601.3.4, to provide clarified mailing standards for the packaging and markings for mailpieces containing nonhazardous liquids. On July 9, 2018, the Postal Service published a Federal Register proposed rule ( 83 FR 31712-31713) relating to its intent to revise mailing standards for nonhazardous liquids, then a Federal Register final rule (84 FR 9716-9719) titled "New Mailing Standards for Mailpieces Containing Liquids." In the final rule, the Postal Service stated that it will revise DMM 601.3.4 relating to mailpieces containing nonhazardous liquids, and similarly revise Publication 52 to align with DMM 601.3.4. These Publication 52 revisions are provided as part of this general update.

The Postal Service will make various revisions to Appendix A to direct readers to section 348.22 for specified acidic materials not restricted to the general 15 percent concentration level limit applicable to most acidic materials. The Postal Service will also revise Appendix A to specify that certain Class 9 materials do not qualify for air transportation as consumer commodity materials, and to correct the mailing standards to specify that UN3164, Articles, pressurized pneumatic, or hydraulic containing nonflammable gas, are under Packaging Instruction 2B instead of 2A.

Other minor revisions in this update include:
- Revising section 325.1, Nonmailable Warning Labels, to add clarity.
- Revising section 335 to clarify that ORM-D markings are prohibited in Postal Service air networks and international mail.
- Revising section 337, Excepted Quantity, to add clarity.
- Revising 343.23, Nonmailable Flammable and Combustible Liquids, to specify acetone, benzene, and hexane are generally nonmailable.
- Revising the definition of oral and inhalation toxicity to align with those used by DOT.
- Adding clarifying language to section 453.35, Drug Paraphernalia.
- Revising the Appendix B listing for UN2796, Sulfuric Acid with not more than 51 percent acid, to reflect the alternate shipping name "Battery Fluid, acid."
The Postal Service will make various revisions to Appendix A to provide clarity, update language, correct erroneous references, and to better align the information with 49 CFR 172.101, Table of Hazardous Materials. Because of the complexity of the changes, these revisions will be made at a later date.

- When there is discoloration around the dollar amounts, this might indicate the amounts were changed.

3. If the money order seems suspicious, call the U.S. Postal Service Money Order Verification System at 866-459-7822.

For postal purposes, the information on an SDS can be useful in determining the mailability of a hazardous material.

\section*{Postal Service's Policy on Workplace Harassment}

The United States Postal Service \({ }^{\oplus}\) (Postal Service \({ }^{T M}\) ) is committed to providing a work environment free of harassment based upon race, color, religion, sex (including pregnancy, sexual orientation, and gender identity including transgender status), national origin, age (40 or over), mental or physical disability, genetic information, uniformed (military) service, or in reprisal for an employee's or applicant's complaint about, or opposition to, discrimination or participation in any process or proceeding designed to remedy discrimination. The Postal Service's workplace must be one in which all employees are treated with dignity and respect by supervisors, subordinates, and coworkers. Supervisors and managers will take prompt action to prevent, address, and remedy workplace conduct that is contrary to this policy.

\section*{Prohibited Activities}

Harassment is unwelcome verbal or physical conduct, which is so severe or pervasive that it interferes with or changes the conditions of one's employment by creating a hostile, intimidating, or abusive working environment. Examples may include, but are not limited to, making offensive or derogatory comments or engaging in physically threatening, intimidating, or humiliating behavior based upon race, color, religion, sex (including pregnancy, sexual orientation, and gender identity including transgender status), national origin, age ( 40 or over), mental or physical disability, genetic information, past, present, or future uniformed (military) service, or in reprisal for an employee's or applicant's complaint about or opposition to discrimination or participation in any process or proceeding designed to remedy discrimination. These activities are prohibited by the Postal Service's policy and may amount to harassment in violation of federal anti-discrimination laws. Violation of this policy may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination. The Postal Service is committed to providing its employees a safe, productive, and inclusive workplace and will tolerate nothing less.

Sexual harassment is defined as unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature such as, but not limited to: making or threatening to make employment decisions based on an employee's submission to, or rejection of, sexual advances or requests for sexual favors; deliberate or repeated unsolicited remarks with a sexual connotation or physical contact of a sexual nature that is unwelcome to the recipient; or behavior that creates a sustained hostile or abusive work environment so severe or pervasive that it unreasonably interferes with or changes the conditions of one's employment.

Although not every instance of inappropriate behavior may fit the legal definition of harassment, such behavior in the workplace undermines morale and violates the Postal Service's standards of conduct. Disciplinary action may result even if the conduct does not constitute harassment under the law.

\section*{Management Responsibility}

All managers and supervisors are responsible for preventing harassment and inappropriate behavior that could lead to illegal harassment, and must respond promptly when they learn of any such conduct. Any manager or supervisor who receives a complaint must see that a prompt and thorough investigation is conducted. Investigations of all forms of harassment must be done in accordance with the "Initial Management Inquiry Process (IMIP)." Materials are available in Publication 552, Manager's Guide to Understanding, Investigating, and Preventing Harassment. When harassment or inappropriate conduct is found, managers must take prompt and effective corrective action.

\section*{Employees' Rights and Responsibilities}

Postal Service employees who believe that they are the victims of harassment prohibited under this policy (i.e., harassment based on race, color, religion, sex (including pregnancy, sexual orientation, and gender identity including transgender status), national origin, age (40 or over), mental or physical disability, genetic information, uniformed (military) service, or in reprisal for an employee's or applicant's complaint about or opposition to discrimination or participation in any process or proceeding designed to remedy discrimination) or who have witnessed such harassment or inappropriate conduct, should bring the situation to the attention of a supervisor, a manager, or the manager of Human Resources. Refer to Publication 553, Employee's Guide to Understanding, Preventing, and Reporting Harassment for further information. In accordance with this policy, supervisors, managers, managers of Human Resources, or the next higher level manager (HQ and HQ-field units) are responsible for ensuring that direct and prompt action is taken to investigate and, where appropriate, remedy such misconduct when brought to their attention. The Postal Service will protect the confidentiality of harassment complainants to the fullest extent possible.

Employment discrimination or reprisal for engaging in an Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO)protected activity is prohibited. Employees may request pre-complaint counseling through the online Postal Service EEO efile application at https://efile.usps.com or in writing by providing their name, Social Security or employee identification number, address, and telephone number to: National EEO Investigative Services Office-EEO Contact Center, Post Office Box 21979, Tampa, FL 33622-1979. In addition, bargaining unit employees may seek relief through the relevant grievance-arbitration procedures, and if applicable, non-bargaining unit employees may use the grievance procedures described in Section 652.4, Employee and Labor Relations Manual.

Allegations involving any possible criminal misconduct should, at a minimum, be reported to law enforcement authorities as follows: any physical misconduct relating to workplace harassment (i.e., any physical assault, threat of a physical assault, or stalking) should be reported to the United States Postal Inspection Service (USPIS); use of any electronic device, computer, or Internet to transmit threatening or harassing communications, obscene or indecent images and materials, should be reported to the Office of Inspector General (OIG).

Reprisal against employees who raise a claim of harassment, report inappropriate conduct, or provide evidence in any investigation is illegal and can result in disciplinary action, and should be referred to the USPIS or OIG as appropriate.

The Postal Service does not tolerate any type of harassment, inappropriate conduct, or reprisal in the workplace.

\section*{Tax Talk: Avoid Scams and File Securely}

Tax season is well underway. The filing deadline of April 15,2019 , is fast approaching and cyber criminals are doing everything they can to take full advantage of the opportunity.

These five tips can help ensure that you file securely and don't fall prey to tax scams:
- File early. Criminals can file fraudulent tax returns using your stolen personal information. One of the best defenses is to file before they have the chance.
- Think before you click. Beware of emails, text messages, and social media posts that claim to be from the IRS and contain links or attachments. Cybercriminals may use these to install malware onto your computer to steal your information.
- Set strong passphrases. If you file your taxes online, use a strong passphrase to protect your information (see blue.usps.gov/cyber/password-safety.htm).
- Use secure networks. Criminals can use public Wi-Fi or weak networks to intercept your information. When filing taxes, use a secure, password-protected network.
- Beware of phony calls. The IRS will never ask for credit or debit card information, demand immediate payment, or threaten legal action in a cold call.
If you believe you have been a fraud victim, report it to the IRS at irs.gov/individuals/how-do-you-report-sus-pected-tax-fraud-activity.

\section*{Stamp Announcement 19-16: Transcontinental Railroad Stamps}

©2019 USPS
On May 10, 2019, in Promontory Summit, UT, the U.S. Postal Service \({ }^{\circledR}\) will issue the Transcontinental Railroad stamps (Forever \({ }^{\circledR}\) priced at the First-Class Mail \({ }^{\circledR}\) rate) in three designs, in a pressure-sensitive adhesive pane of 18 stamps (Item 570400). The stamps will go on sale nationwide May 10, 2019, and must not be sold or canceled before the first-day-of-issue. The Transcontinental Railroad pane of 18 stamps may not be split and the stamps may not be sold individually.

Three new stamps in a pane of 18 mark the 150th anniversary of the completion of the transcontinental railroad, a massive engineering feat that reduced travel time across the country from as much as 6 months to about 1 week and made the American West an integral part of the nation. Two different stamps feature the Jupiter and the No. 119 locomotives that powered the trains carrying the officers and guests of two train companies to the "Golden Spike Ceremony," which was held when the two rail lines were joined at Promontory Summit in Utah.

A third stamp portrays the famous golden spike that was a prominent part of the ceremony. Each of the stamps and the header feature gold-foiled highlights that produce a glimmering effect. Art director Greg Breeding designed the issuance. Michael J. Deas painted the Jupiter and No. 119 stamps. Kevin Cantrell illustrated the stamp depicting the ceremonial golden spike and did the border treatments and typography for all three stamps.

\section*{Availability to Post Offices: Item 570400, Transcontinental Railroad (Forever Priced at the First-Class Mail Rate) Commemorative Pane of 18 Stamps}

Stamp Fulfillment Services will make an automatic push distribution to Post Offices of a quantity to cover approximately 30 days of sales. Distribution quantities for the automatic push distribution will be available by logging on to SFS Web at sfsweb.usps.gov. Post Offices may begin ordering stamps on the first-day-of-issue through SFS Web; offices must also check the amount they will receive in their automatic push distribution.

\section*{How to Order the First-Day-of-Issue Postmark}

Customers have 120 days to obtain the first-day-ofissue postmark by mail. They may purchase new stamps at their local Post Office \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) or at The Postal Store \({ }^{\circledR}\) website at usps.com/shop. They must affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes (to themselves or others), and place them in a larger envelope addressed to:

There is a 5-cent charge for each additional postmark over 50. All orders must be postmarked by September 10, 2019.

The Postal Service also offers first-day covers for new stamp issues and Postal Service stationery items postmarked with the official first-day-of-issue cancellation. \section*{Pictorial Postmarks Announcement}

As a community service, the Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) offers pictorial postmarks to commemorate local events celebrated in communities throughout the nation. A list of events for which pictorial postmarks are authorized appears on the following pages. The sponsor of the pictorial postmark appears in italics under the date. Also provided are illustrations of these postmarks.

People attending these local events may obtain the postmark in person at the temporary Post Office \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) station established there. Those who cannot attend the event but who wish to obtain the postmark may submit a mail order request. Pictorial postmarks are available only for the dates indicated, and requests must be postmarked no later than 30 days following the requested pictorial postmark date.

All requests must include a stamped envelope or postcard bearing at least the minimum First-Class Mail \({ }^{\circledR}\) postage. Items submitted for postmark may not include
postage issued after the date of the requested postmark. Such items will be returned unserviced.

Customers wishing to obtain a postmark must affix stamps to any envelope or postcard of their choice, address the envelope or postcard to themselves or others, insert a card of postcard thickness in envelopes for sturdiness, and tuck in the flap. Place the envelope or postcard in a larger envelope and address it to: Pictorial Postmarks, followed by the Name of the Station, Address, City, State, ZIP \(+4^{\circledR}\) Code, as listed next to the postmark.

Customers can also send stamped envelopes and postcards without addresses for postmark, as long as they supply a larger envelope with adequate postage and their return address. After applying the pictorial postmark, the Postal Service returns the items (with or without addresses) under addressed protective cover.

\section*{How to Order the First-Day-of-Issue Digital Color or Traditional Postmarks}

Customers have 120 days to obtain the first-day-ofissue postmarks by mail. Each cover must have sufficient postage to meet First-Class Mail \({ }^{\circledR}\) requirements. Customers may purchase new stamps at their local Post Office \({ }^{\text {TM }}\), by phone at 800-782-6724, or on The Postal Store \({ }^{\circledR}\) website at usps.com/shop.

\section*{Digital Color Postmarks}

Only select stamp issues offer a digital color postmark. Customers may submit \#6 or \#10 envelopes constructed of paper rated as "laser safe." The Postal Service \({ }^{\text {TM }}\) recommends envelopes of 80-pound Accent Opaque, acid-free, \(9 / 16\)-inch side seams with no glue on the flap. The maximum size of all digital color postmarks is 2 inches high by 4 inches long. Allow sufficient space on the envelope to accommodate the postmark. Do not use self-adhesive labels for addresses on the envelope. Two test envelopes must be included. There is a minimum of 10 envelopes at 50 cents per postmark required at the time of servicing. Customers must submit a check, money order, or credit card for payment.

The Postal Service reserves the right to not accept hand-painted and other cachet envelopes that are not compatible with our digital color postmark equipment. The Postal Service also re serves the right to substitute traditional black rubber postmarks if use of nonspecified envelopes results in poor image quality or damage to equipment.

Customers must affix the stamps to the envelopes and address them to themselves or others for return through the mail. Or, they may include an additional self-addressed return envelope, large enough to accommodate their canceled items, with sufficient postage affixed for return of
