PROVO, UT — The United States Postal Service is conducting a Mail Processing Facility Review (MPFR) of processing operations at its Provo Processing and Distribution Center (P&DC). The review was initiated to evaluate moving some of the mail processing operations from the Provo P&DC to the Salt Lake City Auxiliary Service Facility (ASF).
